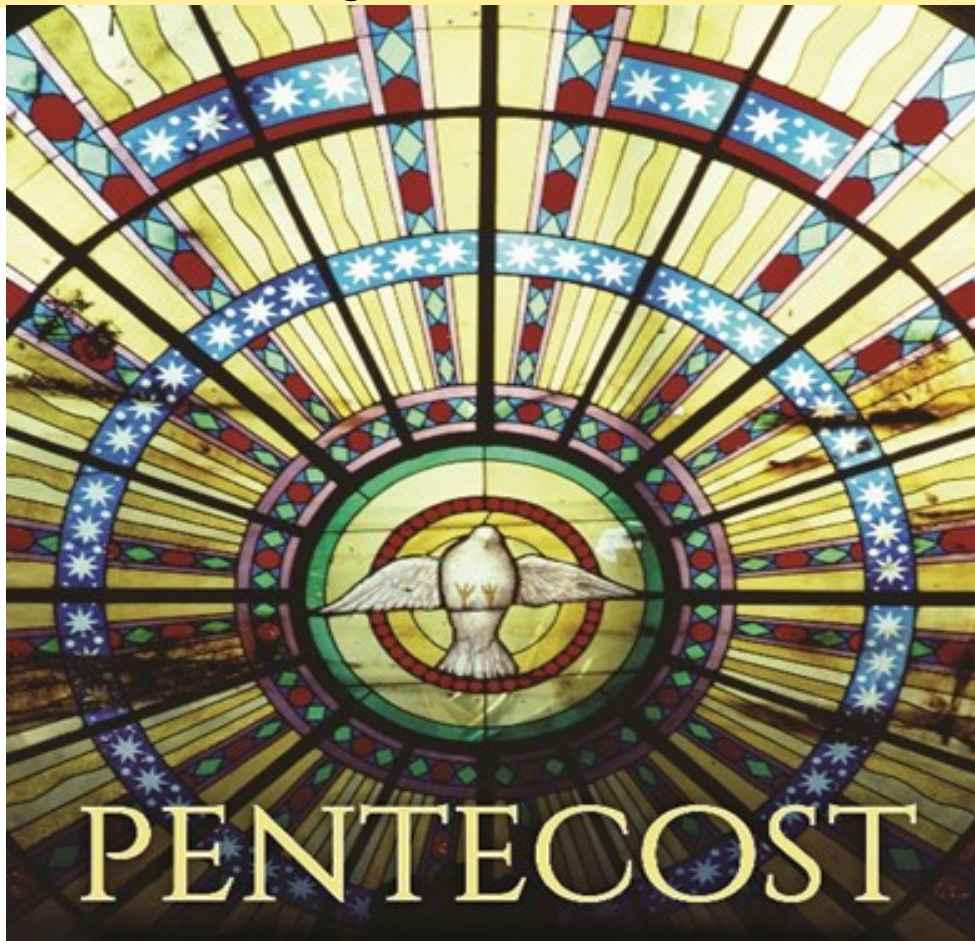

With the celebration of Pentecost Sunday we conclude the Easter Feast.

“Beloved: We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, also groan within ourselves as we await for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.”
(Romans 8:22 - used in the Vigil Mass for Pentecost.)



We share in the very Spirit of God through the risen Christ, yet creation is still groaning in labor pains even within ourselves. The Holy Spirit speaks from within each baptized individual and even at times through others as the Church acknowledges.

Various groups within the Church are vehicles of the work of the Spirit.

Our bishops are a powerful channel for the message of the Spirit.

Certainly the pope’s voice carries much of the creative power of the Holy Spirit.

Recent statements by Pope Francis certainly give evidence of “creation groaning” and a “groan within ourselves.”

Red ribbons are being distributed at the beginning of today’s masses. As you wear the ribbon today, remember that the same Holy Spirit who descended upon the apostles as “tongues of fire” has come into us.

Perhaps you may want to keep these ribbons near a cross in your home or in some area where you often spend time in prayer.

May they remind us that the Holy Spirit is with us, giving the seven wonderful gifts to enrich us.

May we always be aglow with

wisdom, understanding, right judgement, courage, knowledge, reverence, and wondrous awe!

These gifts are indeed freely given by God, but can only be received by opening one’s heart entirely to God.

Papal Encyclical - Laudato Sí - On Care For Our Common Home

“This sister, the earth, now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life. This is why the earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she “groans in travail” (Romans 8:22). We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (Genesis 2:7); our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters.”

Apostolic Exhortation - GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE - (Rejoice and be glad)

“Our defense of the innocent unborn, for example, needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development.

Equally sacred, however, are the lives of the poor, those already born, the destitute, the abandoned and the underprivileged, the vulnerable infirm and elderly exposed to covert euthanasia, the victims of human trafficking, new forms of slavery and every form of rejection.”

Post-Synodal Apostolic Exhortation - AMORIS LAETITIA - (Joy of Love)

“The family is thus an agent of pastoral activity through its explicit proclamation of the Gospel and its legacy of varied forms of witness, namely solidarity with the poor, openness to a diversity of people, the protection of creation, moral and material solidarity with other families, including those most in need, commitment to the promotion of the common good and the transformation of unjust social structures, beginning in the territory in which the family lives, through the practice of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy”.

Each of these three passages from recent papal documents is a breath of air coming forth from the Holy Spirit within the Church.

Each is as old as the Church itself, but each is also seeing the challenge in a new light.

The three passages are a bit of the fresh air found in the lengthy three documents from which they come.

Each says nothing new, yet each is a breath of fresh air which some will appreciate while others will say too much breathing within the Church!



Lord, send out Your Spirit and renew the face of the earth.
